



## **SUPPORTING THE FAITHFUL AND EACH OTHER IN PRAYER DURING THE TIME OF THE COVID-19 CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC**

Although we will be unable to celebrate the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass with the faithful in attendance, we must not forget the sacramental grace we received at our ordination as priests and deacons, and the strength which this grace gives to our prayer of intercession for the Church and the whole world, particularly in our daily offering and faithful celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours.

For clergy and religious, and indeed all the faithful who pray the Liturgy of the Hours, there is an intimate link between the consecration of the day through this prayerful offering of a sacrifice of praise, thanksgiving and intercession, and the offering of the Eucharistic sacrifice. Both are acts of worship offered to the Father, through His Son Jesus Christ and in the Holy Spirit. Both too are offered in communion with and commemorating the Blessed Virgin Mary and all the saints.

In this time of isolation for many of the clergy and faithful, it is vital that we remain conscious of being united as sons and daughters of God our Father, that we are members of the one Body of Christ, His Church, and that we share communion with each other in the Holy Spirit.

I ask you then to join me in using the days and weeks ahead to make our prayer more fervent in the Liturgy of the Hours and, with the intercession of Our Lady of Unfailing Help, St Wilfrid and all the Saints, to implore the Most Holy Trinity to deliver us swiftly from the current pandemic afflicting the world.

The temporary suspension of the public celebration of Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is an unprecedented and disturbing situation for us. It does, however, afford us an opportunity for solidarity with those who are elderly or suffering from long-term illnesses for whom separation from the Community of Faith as expressed in the liturgical assembly is the norm and who cannot be physically present at the celebration of Holy Mass with any regularity. It is also an opportunity for us all to rediscover our profound love for the Holy Eucharist, either through a longing to receive Holy Communion once again or, for the clergy, a longing to give Holy Communion to the faithful once again.

That said, it is more important than ever, during such a time of trial and uncertainty, that the voice of prayer never becomes silent and, most especially, that the Church's Liturgy continues to be celebrated, with the active participation of the faithful, in whatever way it can. I ask all priests to continue to celebrate Holy Mass daily, although without the assistance of the faithful, and to communicate to the faithful that you continue to do this and keep them in your hearts and intentions. I am sure that this will bring them much consolation and encouragement.

There are a number of ways in which the faithful can participate in Holy Mass. They could watch a celebration of Mass on the television or internet, making a Spiritual Communion at the normal time for Holy Communion, or prayerfully read the daily Mass Readings alone or in families, reciting some familiar prayers and making an Act of Spiritual Communion. The details of some helpful resources are described below.

### **DAILY MASS READINGS, LITURGY OF THE HOURS AND REFLECTIONS**

A good number of the faithful have access to the daily and Sunday Mass readings in personal missals. The faithful can also access the daily Mass Readings online in many places. One such website is *Universalis* which, in addition to the paid app used by many of us, allows access to the daily Mass Readings, Liturgy of the Hours and information on the Saints of the Day for free for the current day and one week ahead. The faithful could be encouraged, each day or each Sunday, to prayerfully read the day's readings and make an Act of Spiritual Communion. Please use the following link: <https://universalis.com/>. Many of us, clergy and laity alike, use *Magnificat* booklets in one way or another. The U.S. version has kindly made online access to its publication free for the time being. This provides a form of Morning, Evening and Night Prayer, the daily Mass Readings, a daily meditation and Saint of the Day. ### **ROSARY AND STATIONS OF THE CROSS**

Please encourage the faithful, especially those who are isolated, to intensify their life of prayer in whatever way they can, for those who are ill, for health workers, for those in public office and those working to contain the spread of the virus, for the anxious, for our own families and communities, and for those who have died. In particular, I would recommend the recitation of the Holy Rosary and the Stations of the Cross.
